Disaster Relief

In New York City, over 180 hurricane-related repair project applications through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program are awaiting federal approval. [Capital New York](#)

Gov. Christie conditionally vetoed the Sandy Bill of Rights, a bill with unanimous support from the legislature to improve Sandy recovery efforts. [The New York Times](#)
